***A Special Report on Legislation  
Vital to American Retirees***

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This past year the nation continued to see unprecedented economic and fiscal challenges the likes of which had not been seen in decades. Retirees faced these hardships as well. While the economy began a slow recovery, unemployment remained high. We also celebrated the 75th anniversary of Social Security and 45th anniversary of Medicare, vivid reminders that even during times of economic hardship these two vital programs have remained strong, delivering the guaranteed benefits for which retirees worked hard.

Congress devoted much time and effort to health care reform. The enactment of the new legislation was a slow, tedious process that had many delays and many attempts to derail it. The law, signed by President Obama, contains many positive changes for retirees and older Americans, some immediate and some in the near future. The Medicare Part D doughnut begins to close. There will be no more co-payments for Medicare covered preventive screenings as well as for an annual wellness checkup. Medicare Advantage overpayments will end and thus extend the financial health of the Medicare Trust Fund. Pre-Medicare retirees will have help in affording health care.

Much of the cause of the economic distress over the past few years was due to Wall Street excesses that put the global economy in jeopardy. Congress enacted legislation to reform Wall Street practices and bring more transparency and oversight to the financial markets. Yet, there are those who would cut Social Security and Medicare benefits to make up for the excesses of Wall Street. We still must remain on guard against efforts to privatize and cut the Social Security and Medicare programs. We must continue to remind all Americans that they are programs that benefit all generations, not just retirees.

It is up to us to advocate for those issues on which older Americans depend for a respectable quality of life in retirement.

This Voting Record reflects how committed our elected representatives are to retirees and older Americans. Use it to educate yourself on where your elected representatives stand. Get active today and help create an America that protects the health and economic security of seniors, strengthens families and builds safe and thriving communities.

# SENATE VOTES

*The following is a list of ten key votes selected as representative of the votes of critical importance to retirees taken by the U.S. Senate:*

## 1 Fiscal Commission Creation

Senator Conrad, D-ND, introduced an amendment to legislation raising the debt ceiling that would create a fiscal commission with the authority to recommend changes to programs such as Social Security and Medicare. Congress would then vote on the recommendations as a package without the opportunity to amend it. The amendment failed 53-46. Sixty votes are necessary for passage under a debate agreement for this bill. A **NO** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.J. Res. 45, Roll Call No. 5, January 26, 2010.

## 2 \$250 Stimulus Payment I

Senator Sanders, I-VT, offered an amendment to a stimulus bill that would provide a \$250 payment to Social Security recipients and other retirees in 2011 since there was no cost of living increase in 2010. The amendment failed 50-47. Sixty votes are necessary for passage under the Budget Act. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4213, Roll Call No. 36, March 3, 2010.

## 3 Eliminate CLASS Act

Senator Thune, R-SD, introduced an amendment to the health care reform reconciliation bill that would repeal the CLASS Act, a voluntary, affordable, and self-funded program for long term care. The amendment failed 43-55. Sixty votes are necessary for passage under the Budget Act. A **NO** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4872, Roll Call No. 77, March 24, 2010.

## 4 Stop Health Care Repeal

Senator Vitter, R-LA, introduced an amendment to the health care reform reconciliation bill that would repeal the underlying health care reform law. Included in the repeal was the loss of new benefits for Medicare recipients such as an annual wellness checkup. The motion to table (set aside) the amendment was adopted 58-39. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4872, Roll Call No. 84, March 24, 2010.

## 5 Keep Medicare Intact

Senator Bunning, R-KY, introduced an amendment to the health care reconciliation bill that would allow individuals to opt out of Medicare Part A hospital insurance. The effect would be the dismantling of Medicare as a social insurance program. The motion to table (set aside) the amendment was adopted 61-36. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4872, Roll Call No. 87, March 24, 2010.

## 6 Health Care Reform

The Senate passed health care reform legislation, which contained several pro-retiree measures. Included among them were the elimination of co-pays and deductibles for preventive care screenings and an annual wellness checkup starting in 2011. The bill also included the closing of the Part D doughnut hole coverage gap, the phasing out of overpayments to Medicare Advantage insurance companies, and incentives for employers to keep early retiree health care coverage. The bill passed 56-43. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4872, Roll Call No. 105, March 25, 2010.

## 7 Medicare Physician Payments I

The Senate passed a short term bill preventing pending cuts to physician reimbursement rates under Medicare. The cuts could cause physicians from caring for Medicare patients. The bill passed 59-38. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4851, Roll Call No. 117, April 15, 2010.

## 8 Medicare Physician Payments II

The Senate attempted to invoke cloture on a bill to prevent pending cuts to physician reimbursement rates under Medicare. Also included in the bill was additional funding for the Medicaid program, which provides funding for many seniors in nursing homes. The motion to invoke cloture on the amendment failed 56-40. Sixty votes are necessary to invoke cloture. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4213, Roll Call No. 194, June 17, 2010.

## 9 Financial Reform

The Senate passed the conference report for financial regulatory reform. Included are provisions to protect consumers from hidden fees as well as investment scams, which target many seniors. The conference reported passed 60-39. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4173, Roll Call No. 208, December 15, 2010.

## 10 \$250 Stimulus Payment II

Senator Sanders, I-VT, introduced a bill that would provide a \$250 payment to Social Security recipients and other retirees since there was no cost of living increase in 2010. The motion to invoke cloture on the bill failed 53-45. Sixty votes are necessary to invoke cloture. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. S. 3985, Roll Call No. 267, December 8, 2010.







# HOUSE VOTES

*The following is a list of ten key votes selected as representative of the votes of critical importance to retirees taken by the U.S. House of Representatives:*

## 1 Health Care Reform I

The House passed health care reform legislation, which contained several pro-retiree provisions. Included among them were the elimination of co-pays and deductibles for preventive care screenings and an annual wellness checkup beginning in 2011. The bill also included the closing of the Part D doughnut hole coverage gap, the phasing out of overpayments to Medicare Advantage insurance companies, and incentives for employers to maintain early retiree health care coverage. The bill passed 219-212. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 3590, Roll Call No. 165, March 21, 2010.

## 2 Health Care Reform II

The House passed a package of budget reconciliation provisions to the health care reform legislation. The legislation was a companion bill to health care reform that enabled the enactment of health care reform. The bill passed 220-211. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4872, Roll Call No. 167, March 21, 2010.

## 3 Wall Street Reform

The House passed the conference report to curb abuses in the financial services industry. Including in the reforms are provisions to develop educational materials and training to reduce the fraudulent marketing of financial products to seniors. The conference report passed 237-192. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4173, Roll Call No. 413, June 30, 2010.

## 4 Generic Drugs

The House passed a funding bill that included a provision to prohibit brand name drug companies from entering into “pay-for-delay” agreements with generic drug companies. Under such arrangements, brand name companies could delay the introduction of generic drugs into the marketplace, which costs consumers and taxpayers billions yearly in unnecessary drug costs. The bill passed 239-182. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 4899, Roll Call No. 430, July 1, 2010.

## 5 Stop Senior Fraud

The House passed a bill introduced by Rep. Baldwin, D-WI, that authorized more than \$150 million over five years for the Federal Trade Commission and Justice Department to conduct consumer education and outreach programs regarding fraud targeting senior citizens. The bill passed 335-81. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 3040, Roll Call No. 487, July 29, 2010.

## 6 Senior Housing

The House included \$825 million in funding for the Department of Housing and Urban Affairs to be used for the rehabilitation and construction of new housing for low income seniors. There are long waiting lists for seniors who need affordable housing. The bill passed 251-167. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 5850, Roll Call No. 499, July 29, 2010.

## 7 Medicaid Funding

The House passed legislation which provided \$16.1 billion in funding for the operation of state Medicaid programs. The most common Medicaid recipient is a nursing home resident, which makes the program vital to older Americans. The bill passed 247-161. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 1586, Roll Call No. 518, August 10, 2010.

## 8 \$250 Stimulus Payment

The House debated a bill, introduced by Rep. Pomeroy, D-ND, that would provide a \$250 payment to Social Security recipients and other retirees in 2011 since there was no cost of living increase under in 2010. The bill failed 254-153. Two-thirds of members present and voting are required under the House’s suspension calendar rules. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 5987, Roll Call No. 611, December 8, 2010.

## 9 Food Safety Reform

The House passed a bill introduced by Rep. Sutton, D-OH, giving the Food and Drug Administration authority to directly recall tainted products, rather than waiting on voluntary cooperation from manufacturers. Food safety recalls have become more frequent and have affected more seniors in recent years. The bill passed 215-144. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 2751, Roll Call No. 661, December 21, 2010.

## 10 Retiree Programs Funding

The House passed an appropriations bill that contains several key retiree program provisions. Included were \$5.1 billion for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), on which many seniors rely. The bill passed 193-165. A **YES** vote is the pro-retiree vote. H.R. 3082, Roll Call No. 662, December 21, 2010.
