Effective Voter Contact Methods

The most successful field tactics are:

- Targeted
- Repeatable
 - Multiple contacts per voter
 - Easily understood by volunteers
- Measurable
 - Who are we talking to?
 - What are the issues they care about?
 - o Is our messaging correct?
 - Did it work?Fighting forRetirement

Why does direct voter contact matter?

A number of studies have shown that by using traditional Get out the Vote (GOTV) tactics, with new messages informed by psychology research, may **make campaigns' turnout efforts up to 10 times more effective.**



Canvassing

- Canvassing is the most effective way to get voters to turn out
- With a personalized message, you can provide information the voter needs on election day and urge them to turnout



Phone banking

- Volunteer-led phone banks have proven more successful than commercial phone banks
- Personal interactions can make personal connections, which has a positive impact on turnout




Direct mailings

- Direct mailings can ensure that you can reach all target voters and get your message to them
- Combining generic mailings with appeals to civic duty can increase turnout



Spotlight: canvassing



In 44 out of 51 experiments, canvassing was found to increase voter turnout

Best practices for direct voter contact



Personalized messages and methods are key, whether through phone calls or canvassing.



Volunteer phone banks are more effective at mobilizing voters than professional phone banks.



Mobilization through the spread of information in one's own network can increase turnout.



Having a **trusted messenger** who can empathize with a voter's lived experience increases turnout



Spotlight: phone calls

Voters who are asked about a voting implementation plan are

4.1%

more likely to turnout to vote

Key factors to increase turnout:



Ask potential voters if they intend to vote

• Studies have shown that the action of self-prediction makes someone more likely to vote



Ask how a potential voter plans to vote

 Making a plan by asking what time and where they would vote makes someone more likely to vote
